PRINCIPALS REPORT

Respect

Respect is such an important component of a productive and cohesive school. At Richmond North, it represents one of our 3 core values. We value it but more importantly we expect our students to display it. Most of our students understand respect - what it is, what it looks like and how to display it. Unfortunately though, it has recently become apparent that some of our students are having difficulty behaving in a respectful manner towards staff and other students. This situation cannot continue. Every teacher and student has the right to be treated respectfully at Richmond North. While we certainly understand that students can sometimes face real challenges in terms of managing their behaviour, this cannot override peoples' right to be treated respectfully. Every year, teachers take time to review and discuss the 5 school rules to ensure that students are aware of the expectations and understand what these behaviours look like in real terms. We put in place strategies to support students in meeting these expectations and we spend time working with students who require help achieving the expectations. Despite our best efforts though, there are still instances where students are behaving disrespectfully towards staff and other students. At a school level we are taking this issue seriously and are addressing it immediately in the following ways -

- 1. Tightening up consequences for students who are behaving disrespectfully
- 2. Ensuring instances of disrespect are communicated to parents
- 3. Implementing a whole school program Connect to Respect that will - provide a series of lessons that teachers can use to teach respectful behaviour; provide posters for the classroom and playground to reinforce the message; and implement an incentive and reward program that recognises instances of great respectful behaviour.

From 2019 we will be introducing a whole school social skills program aimed at building skills in areas such as confidence, persistence, resilience, organisation and getting along.

In order to fully address this issue though, we need the support of parents. It is important that the messages we are delivering at school are also reinforced at home. Consistency of the message is the key. We need parents to communicate that –

- Everyone has a right to be treated respectfully and in turn should treat others respectfully.
- Treating someone respectfully is not the same as 'getting our/their way'.
- It is not ok to hit or injure others even if we are angry or annoyed with them.
- It is not ok to swear or speak inappropriately to teachers, adults or other students at school even if we angry or annoyed with them.
- Respect is an 'all the time thing' not just a thing we do when we are happy, calm or get what we want.

As parents and teachers, it is important to teach children to separate their behaviour from the context. For example - If we swear at someone (speak disrespectfully) there is a consequence for that REGARDLESS of the reasons for doing it. Often when a child gets in trouble for something like swearing, they will respond by saying things like "they swore at me first" or "they made me angry" or "I couldn't help it". Whether this is true or not, we need to be consistent in the message that their behaviour is not ok. The focus needs to remain on THEIR behaviour, not the context, if we are to give ourselves a chance of correcting it. When we choose to focus on the context. or reasons for the behaviour, we encourage children to make excuses and to think that the rule only applies in some cases and not in others. When we open this door, we are inviting children to always make excuses for their behaviour as they learn that these excuses can get them out of trouble or at least lessen the severity of the consequence. That is not to say that we don't listen to what children have to say at all. Sometimes the explanation they give regarding what happened in the lead up to their behaviour can provide insights that may be helpful in planning for the future – to reduce the risk of repeat behaviour. However, we need to be clear with children that the consequence for their behaviour will apply regardless of the context. By doing this, we are teaching children that they must find better ways to deal with their anger, frustration and hurt.

The following extract is taken from the NSW Department of Education Behaviour Code for Students document

In NSW public schools students are expected to:

- Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- Strive for the highest standards in learning
- Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members
- Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Respect all property
- Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools
- Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

The word 'respect' appears 4 times in the above extract. These expectations are clear. There is no mention of context or excuses. Disrespectful behaviour is not acceptable and will be dealt with in a serious manner.

As I have stated above, we are addressing this serious issue in a proactive, supportive way through the Connect to Respect program. However, where this is not successful in addressing disrespectful behaviour, we are prepared to address this through the school discipline process.

By working together, school and parents on the same page, we give ourselves the best chance at resolving this issue and reaching a positive outcome for students. This in turn makes our school a stronger and more cohesive community. As Principal, I know how important it is to have parent support in this endeavor. I recognise and appreciate the amazing work that parents already do raising great kids. In this instance, I am asking for your support in ensuring that we maintain a consistent message to all students about the importance and value of promoting respectful behaviour.

DAY 2


